Luna Dance & Creativity is a nationally recognized arts leader and institution that supports children, families, artists, teachers, leaders, schools, communities, and arts organizations through programs that promote creativity and self-determination through the transformative power of dance. Founded in 1992, Luna has become the most comprehensive dance education organization on the West Coast. Luna provides education services to the youth and families who are the least likely to receive the benefits of an arts education, including children and caregivers in the dependency system and living in poverty; youth living in neighborhoods and attending schools with little to no access to arts programs; and students diagnosed with autism, special learning needs, and other disabilities. Luna serves children, families, and dance practitioners through partnerships with schools, social service agencies, and arts and cultural organizations.

Last year, 419 teachers, 29,021 students, 3,282 with disabilities from twelve CA counties (Alameda, Marin, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, Monterey, West Contra Costa, Orange, Madera, San Diego, Riverside, Santa Clara), seventeen national school districts (Oakland, Berkeley, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Lafayette, Santa Monica, Santa Barbara, Goleta, San Rafael, Monterey Peninsula, Madera, Alameda, Hayward, Novato, Chicago, New York City's #9 and #75), and two international mentorships (Brazil and Canada) received Luna's programs and resources.
